

The Purpose

- To Accelerate Economic Growth & Job Creation in the County
- Louth County Economic Development Strategy (2009 2015), commissioned by the Louth Local Authorities from Indecon International Economic Consultants:
 - its recommendations have shaped the work of the Forum
- The Louth Economic Forum sliced economic potential into 10 specific areas to be addressed within its work programme. A Task Group has been established for each of the areas.
- In 2014 the Forum added 'Retail Regeneration' to its themes.

The Process & Democratic Mandate

- **Step 1** Establishment of **Task Group** and appointment of a **Chairperson**
- Step 2 Presentation of draft Action Plan to Louth Economic Forum (amendments made as agreed)
- Step 3 Presentation of draft Action Plan to relevant CEO of National Agency to ensure agreed actions are in line with national strategies and to receive endorsement of the Plan (amendments made as agreed)
- Step 4 Democratic Mandate: Presentation of draft Action Plan to Louth County Council Members and Louth County Development Board (amendments made as agreed)
- **Step 5 Publication** and **Launch** of Action Plan

Foreign Direct Investment Action Plan

Action Examples:

- 1 Co-operate with IDA Ireland in marketing and promotion of the county
- 2 IDA Ireland commitment to promote 110 acre serviced site (water, Gas etc) for Bio Pharma & Pharmaceutical companies
- 3 Promote Louth with its huge catchment population for a range of international services

Progress:

- Warner Chilcott 200 jobs 2010
- Prometric reached 100 jobs in 2013
- PayPal/Ebay 1850 jobs by 2018



Making Louth the Best County to do Business

Aspirations Followed by **Action**.

- ❖ Introduction, in 2010, of Business Incentive Schemes (Drogheda & Dundalk), to encourage use of vacant commercial town centre property. Grant of 50% reduction in 1st Year and 25% reduction in 2nd Year.
- Amended Development Contribution Scheme 2010-2014 which saw the introduction of a 50% reduction for businesses who were: Manufacturing / Internationally Tradable / Financial Services Supported & Certified by IDA and or Enterprise Ireland.



Examples of the Fruits of Collaboration (1)

Decision of PayPal to Establish in Dundalk:

The recent announcement of an additional **400** jobs will bring the planned workforce at PayPal Dundalk to **1,400**. When combined with the eBay sister company in Dundalk, the combined employee numbers in Dundalk is projected to reach **1,850** by 2018, that is, four years from now.

Examples of Collaboration (2)climote - Remote Home Heating Management

- **climote** is a Dundalk based company which is a pioneer in home heating and energy monitoring via remote control using mobile phone technology.
- Louth County Council, with the support of age related expertise in DkIT, facilitated trials of this service in Local Authority Housing in Dundalk.
- Installed as pilot scheme in 'Cooley Park' and now being rolled out to 2,200 Local Authority homes throughout the County.
- This project is a striking example of successful collaboration between Louth County Council, SEAI, Electric Ireland, Deligant and Climote.

What the Louth Economic Forum Has Shown:

The promotion of Economic Development by the Louth Economic Forum has created a new economic momentum for County Louth.

Louth County Council has demonstrated that through their leadership, Local Government has a significant role to play in Economic Development.



The Challenges (1): Complex and Detailed Process

- **Extremely Detailed Requirements:**
- (a) 2014 Act, (b) Regulations (c) Policy Guidelines
- Elaborate Process to Reach Publication Day:
- **Step 1:** Draft Plan
- **Step 2: Public Consultation Process**
- **Step 3: Publish Report on Consultation Process**
- **Step 4:** New Draft of Plan Taking Account of Public Consultation
- **Step 5:** Consult with Publicly Funded Bodies who have a Contribution to make.
- **Step 6:** Consult with Municipal District Members
- **Step 7:** Consult with the Regional Assembly
- **Step 8: Publish the Plan.**



The Challenges (2): Will Government Departments & State Agencies be in Position to Make Commitments to Plans of 31 Local Authorities?

- Staff Resources? Because of staff reductions, unlikely to be able to participate in each Local Community Development Committee (LCDC)
- Commitments? Unlikely to have authority to make binding commitments to plans in 31 areas which will be subsequently monitored.
- "Brownie Points"? Will staff & organisations get "Brownie Points" for successful contributions to local Plans?



The Challenges (3): Unrealistic Economic Expectations

Examples:

(a) Foreign Direct Investment (FDI):

Given increasing concentration in cities, unlikely that each county could have realistic FDI targets.

(b) Tourism:

In many cases, real potential lies in collaboration with other counties

e.g. Cavan – Fermanagh Geo Tourism Boyne Valley – Louth/Meath
