

Profile of Public Library Services 2015

- 17.6 million visits to libraries in 2015
- 903,000 registered members (20% of the population)
- 18.4 million books, CDs and DVDs borrowed
- 2.3 million internet sessions provided on 2,000 Internet access PCs and via free Wi-Fi

- 336 branch libraries and 30 mobile libraries.
- Local Authorities spent approx. €129 million on library services



Library services were given a 'B' grade, (good but with some improvements needed)








Reserved Functions

Preparing a Library Development Plan

- an outline of the existing library services
- the development objectives and priorities



- the measures taken or proposed to be taken to secure objectives
- the financial or other implications of the library programme

Reserved Functions

Annual Budget

- Each local authority prepares an annual budget for library service.
- The annual budget is a key element of the library plan for the year.
- Book Fund: the average spend is currently €1.68 per capita.

The national standard and benchmark target is €3.77 per capita.

Public Library Strategy

- Opportunities for All, 2013-2017
- Ambitious strategy for library service development and innovation
- Positioning the library service in the broader local authority strategy

 - €22 million for 16 new libraries
- Free library membership is now available across Ireland from January 2016
- Books are central to a library service. The Department has set a per capita stock fund target of €3.77



Aims:


- To provide opportunities for individuals to develop as literate, informed citizens

- To act as a support network for those seeking employment










Bibliotherapy




- Bibliotherapy refers to the beneficial effects of reading with a therapeutic outcome in mind.
- An example of the Compassionate Communities Project is Moyross library working in partnership with Milford Care Hospice Centre to develop a bibliotherapy section in the library

 This initiative includes a dedicated collection of books and materials on all aspects of coping with loss and bereavement.






- Additional opening hours for public not staffed
- □ 8am 10pm, 7 days per week 365 days a year
- Pilots in Tullamore, Banagher & Tubbercurry
- Self-service, study, internet, wifi, community meetings
- Open Libraries membership (over 16s)





- Very successful abroad, particularly in Scandinavian countries
- Reaches a broader range of customers
- Access available when it suits customer
- Very few incidents





Recommendations:

- Extend on incremental basis
- Minimum of 1 model per local authority
- New projects to have Open Libraries integrated into plans
- Complement and enhance service offer
