1.5.5 UN Sustainable Development Goals

The 17 UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) set out a holistic approach to achieving a sustainable future for all. Ireland is committed to achieving the SDGs as set out in the Department of Communications, Climate Action & Environment 'The Sustainable Development Goals National Implementation Plan 2018-2020' (2018).

It is a Policy Objective of the Council to contribute, as practicable, via this Plan, towards achievement of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals of the United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

1.7 Development Plan Vision

The Vision for Dún Laoghaire-Rathdown is to embrace inclusiveness, champion quality of life through healthy placemaking, grow and attract a diverse innovative economy and deliver this in a manner that enhances our environment for future generations.

The Development Plan Vision has been crafted having regard to the National Strategic Outcomes set out in the NPF, the Regional Strategic Outcomes set out in the RSES, the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the 8 Corporate Goals set out in the DLR 'Corporate Plan 2020 – 2024' and the unique character of DLR.



Waterford City and County Development Plan

As such, Waterford commits to a policy objective which places 'Learning' at its core; by learning from Cork City's journey as a Learning City²³ and Region, and taking measures to implement these and become a Learning City and County (joining the UNESCO Global Network of Learning Cities (GNLC)). Implementing measures towards 'building' a learning city will assist in ensuring that Waterford develops a culture of learning opportunity and support that is intended to lead to socially and economically sustainable communities, and will also support attainment of the Sustainable Development Goals at the local level and achieving aspects of the SRSES economic vision and principles.

Bristol Local Voluntary Review

 <p>1 NO POVERTY</p>	<p>The proportion of children living in poverty increased between 2013 and 2018, and 32% of neighbourhoods had income poverty rates of 20% or more in 2015. More data is needed to monitor this goal effectively.</p>
 <p>2 ZERO HUNGER</p>	<p>Some areas of Bristol experience high levels of food insecurity and the percentage of underweight children has risen. Several large partnership-based initiatives have been launched to address these challenges.</p>
 <p>3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELL-BEING</p>	<p>Mortality rates from cardiovascular disease and from preventable forms of non-communicable diseases have declined, but the life expectancy gap between the most deprived and least deprived has increased since 2012.</p>
 <p>4 QUALITY EDUCATION</p>	<p>Education attainment and early years readiness scores have increased, with notable convergence across ethnic groups, although the proportion entering higher education is below the UK average and varies significantly across wards.</p>
 <p>5 GENDER EQUALITY</p>	<p>The proportion of female elected officials has been rising in Bristol, but the gender pay gap in the city has not been reduced and rates of domestic abuse and sexual violence have risen. More data is needed to monitor this goal effectively.</p>
 <p>6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION</p>	<p>Citizens enjoy near-universal access to clean water and sanitation, and Bristol is not currently at risk of water stress. There is scope to reduce per capita consumption to ensure sustainable resource consumption as the city grows.</p>

<p>7 AFFORDABLE AND CLEAN ENERGY</p> 	<p>Household energy consumption and the energy intensity of Bristol's economy have both fallen. Installed capacity of renewables has risen. An acceleration in these trends is required to achieve the 2030 target and fuel poverty persists</p>
<p>8 DECENT WORK AND ECONOMIC GROWTH</p> 	<p>Bristol's economy has grown strongly since 2010, unemployment is decreasing, and wages have risen. Youth and ethnic inequality within unemployment remain significant challenges.</p>
<p>9 INDUSTRY, INNOVATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE</p> 	<p>The carbon intensity of Bristol's diverse economy has been declining since 2010 while the proportion of commuters walking and cycling has increased, alongside the proportion of citizens accessing the internet.</p>
<p>10 REDUCED INEQUALITIES</p> 	<p>Bristol's Gini coefficient is slightly below the national average, but the gap in earnings between the top 10% and bottom 10% has been rising. Reported incidents of racial discrimination and harassment have also risen sharply.</p>
<p>11 SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND COMMUNITIES</p> 	<p>The ratio of income to house prices has increased significantly, and homelessness has risen since 2010. Public transport use and air pollution have both improved, but perceptions of safety have worsened.</p>
<p>12 RESPONSIBLE CONSUMPTION AND PRODUCTION</p> 	<p>Recycling rates have increased and total waste production has decreased slightly over the past year, however food waste has increased. More data is needed to monitor this goal effectively.</p>

13 CLIMATE ACTION 	In 2018 Bristol was the first UK city to declare a climate emergency. Strong civic will to achieve carbon neutrality by 2030 will need to be followed by ambitious action across sectors and support from higher levels of government.
14 LIFE BELOW WATER 	According to EU Water Framework Directive, 86% of Bristol's rivers are in 'moderate' ecological condition. Community based initiatives are working to improve conditions alongside larger organisations in the region.
15 LIFE ON LAND 	Bristol citizens benefit from extensive green spaces and tree canopy cover has increased since 2010. A recent award of £1 million will support the further development of sustainable management practices for parks and open spaces.
16 PEACE, JUSTICE AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS 	Bristol is a safe city with strong judicial institutions, but violent crime and domestic abuse rates have risen in step with national trends. Reports of modern slavery have increased. There has been an encouraging reduction in young offending.
17 PARTNERSHIPS FOR THE GOALS 	The SDG Alliance has grown rapidly in the last two years and partnerships are forming across the city and across sectors to tackle specific challenges. A number of organisations are also operating internationally to tackle the SDGs.

- Advise constituents to seek greater references to SDGs in their submissions
- Put down amendments to CE's report to ensure SDGs are fully reflected in each chapter.



Localising the SDGs

- Undertake Voluntary Local Reviews
- Seek reports from CE on implementation - targets
- Questions/motions - at Council and Area Committee level
- Seek reports on relevant SDGs at your Strategic Policy Committee
- Ensure SDGs reflected in Local Economic and Community Plans
- Engage with LCDC/PPN and constituent organisations

Localising the SDGs - AILG Actions

- Support greater participation of Local Government in reporting and follow-up mechanisms
- Make localisation of the SDGs an essential part of national strategies
- Support bottom-up monitoring process, such as Voluntary Local Reviews (See Bristol)
- Localisation requires that Local Authorities are provided with resources and capacities commensurate with their responsibilities in the implementation process.
- Boost international cooperation and multi-stakeholder partnerships for SDG localisation.
