2. Home Security





1. Target Hardening

Making your property harder for an offender to access.

- Upgrading the locks on your doors, windows, sheds and outbuildings
- Fitting sash jammers to vulnerable doors and windows
- Using secure passwords to prevent criminals hacking your online accounts



2. Target Removal

Ensuring that a potential target is out of view.

- Not leaving items on view through your windows i.e. laptops, phones, keys, bags
- Putting your vehicle in the garage if you have one and not leaving valuables on display
- Being cautious about what you post online as it may be used to identify or locate you offline



3. Reducing the Means

Removing items that may help commit an offence.

- Not leaving tools and ladders in the garden and clearing up any rubble/bricks
- Keeping wheelie bins out of reach, as they may be a climbing aid or help transport items
- Making sure that bricks and rubble are cleared up



4. Reducing the Payoff

Reducing the profit the criminal can make from the offence.

- Security marking your property
- Marking your property in such a way that others will not want to buy from the thief
- Not buying property you believe or suspect to be stolen



5. Access Control

Looking at measures that will control access to a location, a person or object.

- Locking your doors and windows to both your house and your vehicle
- Ensuring that fencing, hedges, walls and other boundary treatments are in a good state of repair
- Putting a security system in place at a commercial site (entry barriers, security guards, ID cards)



8. Rule Setting

Changing our habits by setting rules and positioning signage in appropriate locations.

- Introducing a rule that the last person entering / leaving should lock the door and remove the keys
- Informing visitors to commercial sites that they must report to reception on arrival
- Informing users that a particular site is closed between certain times and should not be accessed



9. Increase the Chances of Being Caught

Increasing the likelihood that an offender will be caught to prevent crime occurring.

- Making use of dusk to dawn security lighting is in place and in working order
- Using good quality CCTV and/or alarm systems, especially on commercial sites and public places
- Upgrading security to delay an offender, meaning they have to spend more time to gain access



10. Deflecting Offenders

Deterring an offender or deflecting their intention.

- Using timer switches to make our homes look occupied if vacant after the hours of darkness
- Running youth diversionary schemes with partner agencies
- Referring offenders to drug rehabilitation programmes



Personal Security Advice for Elected Officials



Introduction

Thankfully there have been very few major incidents involving violence toward local or national politicians, although when attacks do take place they are widely publicised. This could lend itself to making some elected officials feel that they are more exposed to attacks because of the decisions they are involved in making.

Many elected officials will have experienced unpleasant or challenging interactions with a member of the public, and verbal or written abuse is often accepted as being part and parcel of the role. Whilst most of the aggression experienced will be at the low end of the spectrum of unacceptable behaviour, severe abuse could be considered an offence under the Non Fatal Offences Against the Person Act 1997.



Crime can happen to anyone anytime, anywhere. The culprit think they won't get caught and the victim thinks it won't be me The reality is very different. Fo every crime there is always a victim. Not every culprit will ge caught but every victim will

suffer. This information leaflet is designed to reduce your risk of injury and/or loss from crime in Public Places.

Being "Streetwise" means trusting your gut nstincts, being observant and responding to he information your environment is giving you. Even before you venture outside good preparation will make you feel more Streetwise":

 Tell a friend or a relative where you are going – and what time you are expected back.

- Charge your mobile telephone and
- Consider a personal alarm and check the batteries before you leave home or office.
- Wear comfortable shoes that you can move quickly in, if you need to.
- Fill up with fuel during daylight hours
- Regularly check your tyres (including the spare).



- Check your route, and avoid areas that you feel uncomfortable driving through alone
- Avoid placing your handbag or valuables on the passenger seat beside
- Lock your doors when driving around towns and in remote areas.
- Park Smart in well lit areas
- If a situation is making you feel vulnerable drive to the nearest Garda Station
- If you are using public transport; check timetables before you leave. Keep your valuables secure. St close to the driver. Avoid empty carriages. Have enough money for a tax in an emergency.
- If you are cycling to an appointment, wear appropriate clothing, park your bicycle in a wel lit, secure location and use qualit locks, securing it to an immovable object.



It may be difficult to vary your routine as an elected official out where possible try to avoid:

- Leaving or returning home at exactly the same time.
- Walking the same routes at the same times.







To turn Location services on or off for your Apple device
