"The AILG is a national representative body that proudly represents and supports local democracy. We the elected Councillors provide a strong voice for local communities through effective local government"


Goals of the Association



- □ Provide a range of cost-effective services to Elected Members in accordance with their requirements, , including training and education, policy development, the dissemination of accurate and timely information on all local government financial, policy, legislative, service oriented and democratic issues.

- Promote and encourage wider diverse participation and increase engagement at local government level

- Local Government Audit Service




